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An Interview with the Author

Could you tell us about your background and when you decided that you wanted to lead a literary life?

I have spent my entire career in television. I started as the host of a rock video show but soon transitioned to entertainment reporting. I have always written my own scripts, so the art of writing was not foreign to me. The biggest challenge I had was learning to write fiction.

Is there a book that most influenced your life? Or inspired you to become an author?

I am such a lover of books and good writing that I would never have presumed I could do anything worthy of being published. But once I read *Where'd You Go Bernadette*, I realized that not all novels have to be gut-wrenching. Some can just be funny. And a funny book? That I could write.

How did you become a writer? Would you care to share any writing tips?

I think I've always been a writer in some way or another—from keeping a diary when I was really young, to journaling in my twenties, I've always found that I express myself best through my pen. I think my best tip for writing is to make sure it's a part of your daily routine. Take twenty minutes and write whatever comes to your mind—something that is bothering you, something that made you happy, an incident at work or school. And don't worry what it sounds like. Write as though no one is ever going to read it. That's the way you will find your voice.



What was the inspiration for this novel?

The inspiration for *Class Mom* came shortly after I was fired from being the class mom of my daughter's third-grade class. It was my fifth straight year holding the job, and I definitely had my own way of doing things. Everyone loved my emails and my free-wheeling ways... until someone didn't. When I was asked to leave my position, I was angry and hurt and disappointed, and I channeled that energy into writing a revenge novel! Not really, but being fired gave me the energy shot I needed to write the story.

What is the most interesting or surprising thing you learned as you set out to tell your story?

Writing my first novel was an amazing journey. It took me two years to get the first draft finished and then another six months for all the rewrites the editor wanted. Along the way I learned to be open to other people's suggestions and not have such an ironclad lock on the way the book should go. I also learned that you have to treat writing like any other job. You are expected to show up every day and put your time in. If you don't, you can't expect to ever finish your book.

Are you currently working on another book? Can you tell us about it?

I'm currently working on two books: a sequel to *Class Mom* that will continue Jen Dixon's adventures in the cutthroat parenting world, and a totally different, rather less lighthearted book about a ten-year-old latchkey kid from the 1970s.

Inspiration for the Book
