
## BOOK CLUB KIT

M. T. EDVARDSSON is an author and teacher from Trelleborg, Sweden. He is the author of multiple novels. *A Nearly Normal Family* was his first published in the United States, followed by *The Woman Iniode*. He lives with his family in Löddeköpinge, Sweden.

Tell us how you came up with this page-turning thriller.

The inspiration came from a real criminal case. At the book's opening, police are called to a large home after the pediatrician who lives there has been reported missing from work. In the house, both the doctor and his wife are found dead, but there are no signs of a break-in. Soon enough, the suspicions take an unexpected turn.

Each character except for the "woman inside" is able to give their perspective about the events that led to the crime and its aftermath. Why did you choose to write from multiple viewpoints? And why did you decide to exclude hers?

There are always three sides to every story. At least. I like to twist and turn the reader's perceptions and loyalties. Things are seldom black and white. But a story can be told through silence as well, as is the case with the woman inside.

All the main characters find themselves facing terrible dilemmas, frequently making decisions that cross a line from immoral to illegal. Do you think there is always a limit on how far someone can be pushed before their moral compass falls by the wayside?

I have a peculiar interest in pushing my character's limits. I write about normal people who are put in extreme situations and are forced to make life-altering decisions. It's easy to be morally righteous as long as it's not put to the test for real. You think you know how you'd act in different stressful situations, but when it comes down to brass tacks, we don't know until we get there.

- 11. Who would you cast in a movie version of *The Woman Inside?*


