



DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- What types of songs did singer Pete Seeger share with his audiences?
- Pete Seeger said, "Participation. That's what's gonna save the human race." What do you think that means?
- Pete Seeger followed his own advice and participated in many causes throughout his life. Name some of the causes he supported.
- Pete Seeger and Woody Guthrie performed across the country. What is unusual about the way they traveled?
- Pete Seeger joined the Almanac Singers and the Weavers. Which song by the Weavers became a number one hit?
- Pete Seeger found himself in trouble with the government at one point in his life. Which group questioned him? Why were they interested in him?
- What happened to Pete Seeger and his musical career as a result of his questioning by the government?
- "We Shall Overcome" is a powerful song of hope. For what cause did Pete Seeger first sing the song?
- How did Pete Seeger use his music and focus on participation to clean up the polluted Hudson River?
- Though Pete Seeger was well known, neither fame nor money was that important to him. What ordinary things did he do to fill his time when he was home along the Hudson River?



Encourage students to study the illustrations in *Listen* paying particular attention to the drawings of people in the story. Discuss what the people's actions and expressions tell you about Pete Seeger's impact on those who listened to his music.

Visual Lyrics

Pete Seeger enjoyed singing songs to and with children. He received a Grammy Award for Best Musical Album for Children in 2010 for his album entitled *Tomorrow's Children*. One of his favorite songs to share with kids was "Froggie Went a-Courting." Look up the lyrics to this song and share them with your class. Have students create a three-paneled comic strip that shows in color illustrations and speech bubbles what happened between Froggie and Miss Mousie in the song. Pete Seeger, Activist

Pete Seeger devoted his life to music and the fight for justice, peace, equality, and a cleaner environment. If Seeger were alive today, what causes do your students think he would support with his music? Why is this current cause important, in each student's opinion? Have each student write a persuasive paragraph stating his/her opinion and citing reasons and examples to support it.

Sharing Information

The banjo fascinated Pete Seeger. Early in his life he wrote a letter to his mother asking her advice about purchasing one. Later, Seeger was impressed when he heard Bascom Lamar Lunsford play the five-string banjo at the Mountain Dance and Folk Festival. Pete Seeger took this early interest in the banjo and his experiences playing the instrument and wrote a book called *How to Play the Five-String Banjo*. Invite your students to think of a topic that interests them as much as the banjo interested Seeger. Have each student gather information about his/her topic and then organize it into an informational book that might include a "how to" section. Share your informational books as a class.
